Sec. 2.40 Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care (dealers and exhibitors).

(b) Each dealer or exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include:

(1) The availability of appropriate facilities, personnel, equipment, and services to comply with the provisions of this subchapter;

(2) The use of appropriate methods to prevent, control, diagnose, and treat diseases and injuries, and the availability of emergency, weekend, and holiday care;

(3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian;

(4) Adequate guidance to personnel involved in the care and use of animals regarding handling, immobilization, anesthesia, analgesia, tranquilization, and euthanasia; and(5) Adequate pre-procedural and post-procedural care in accordance with established veterinary medical and nursing procedures.

One male vervet has a laceration on his upper left thigh this date. He was observed sitting on an upper perch in the enclosure. He favored that leg when moving and was reluctant to come to the ground when bananas were offered. I was told that the attending veterinarian saw this animal last week however there is no medical record documenting the visit. The attending veterinarian needs to re-evaluate this animal and determine best course of treatment. Sec. 3.75 Housing facilities, general.

(a) Structure: construction. Housing facilities for nonhuman primates must be designed and constructed so that they are structurally sound for the species of nonhuman primates housed in them. They must be kept in good repair, and they must protect the animals from injury and contain them.

The enclosure housing the 3 Barbary macaques is in need of repair. There is one area where the support pipe has broken and another area where the cattle panel has broken away from the support pipe. The male macaque was observed bouncing on the side of the enclosure which caused the wire to bend outward. These areas need to be repaired to maintain the structural strength of the enclosure and prevent animal injury or escape. Correct By: The welder was called during the inspection and began to repair the enclosure. CORRECTED DURING INSPECTION
