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USA: Captive Elephant Statistics – Human Fatalities 1990-2013

SYNOPSIS: In the last 24 years since 1990, 16 people died in the USA (0.66 human per year) by captive elephants.

REXANO, <u>www.REXANO.org</u>, only used fatality numbers since all deaths are (supposed to be) reported and there is only one degree of death. The average life expectancy of 77 years was used to calculate the lifetime odds.

^{*}The slightly larger number of fatalities at USDA (US Department of Agriculture) only licensed facilities as opposed to USDA & AZA facilities doesn't necessarily mean the AZA facility is safer. Majority of facilities are not accredited by Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), which explains larger number of fatalities occurring at non AZA facilities. Due to the nice weather and other reasons, many circuses have their base in Florida, which explains larger number of elephant related fatalities in that state.

CONCLUSION:

The death by US captive elephant is extremely rare. In the last 24 years since 1990, 16 people died in the USA (0.66 per year) by captive elephants.

That translates to one-year odds of 1 in 480,757,575, and lifetime odds 1 in 6.243.604.

All victims were voluntarily on the property where the animal was kept, be it owner(s), handlers, employees, friends, visitors or spectators wanting to see the animals.

Since 1990, there is no record of a member of the general public in the USA dying as a result of a captive elephant running at large, meaning, unsupervised and OFF the property where the animals were kept. Elephant out of the cage, but still on owners'/zoo/circus property arena, is not considered AT LARGE for our statistical analysis. Captive keeping of elephants might be a voluntarily accepted hobby/occupational hazard, but it is NOT a general public safety issue fatality wise.

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
