He is going to get two girlfriends, both his same age, in April. We have plans to build a brand new cage for the snow leopards, once we have the funds. The cage is to be a huge triplex with artificial glaciers and air-conditioning. Estimated cost is \$7,500.00! STATUS REPORT:

APPEARANCE: SNOW LEOPARDS HAVE LONG THICK GRAY FUR WITH DARK ROSETTES AND SPOTS. THEY HAVE SHORT THICK LEGS AND LONG FLUFFY TAILS.

HABITAT: THE SNOW LEOPARD IS ALWAYS FOUND IN HIGH ROCKY TERRAIN AREAS. THEY CAN LIVE IN A VARIETY OF ALPINE MEADOWS, ALPINE SCRUB, AND HIGH ALTITUDE FORESTS.

DISTRIBUTION: THE SNOW LEOPARD IS FOUND FROM NORTHERN RUSSIA, MONGOLIA, CHINA, NEPAL, BHUTAN, INDIA, PAKISTAN AND AFGHANISTAN.

SOCIAL SYSTEM: SNOW LEOPARDS ARE A SOLITARY ANIMAL. THEY HAVE BEEN SEEN HUNTING IN PAIRS, BUT IT IS MOST LIKELY A MALE AND FEMALE'S TERRITORY OVERLAPPING.

DIET AND HUNTING: SNOW LEOPARDS HUNT MAINLY ON BLUE SHEEP AND MARMOTS, THOUGH IT IS KNOWN FOR THEM TO HUNT ON MUSK DEER, PIKA, HARE, AND BIRDS.

FUN FACTS:

THE SNOW LEOPARD WAS DISCOVERED IN CENTRAL ASIA BY WESTERNERS IN 1761.

A SNOW LEOPARD CAN LEAP 17 AND 1/2 YARDS ACROSS A DITCH WHILE RUNNING UPHILL.

A SNOW LEOPARD CAN TAKE DOWN A FULL GROWN OX.


TERMS OF TRANSFER:

WildLife On Easy Street animal transactions are subject to the following conditions:

1. Animals will not be sold, traded or transferred to any individual or institution for:
 - a. the purpose of providing game for sport or substance hunting.
 - b. use in any stressful or terminal research programs.
 - c. disposal at any animal auction, flea market or swap meet.
2. Specimens will be housed, fed, and maintained in a manner which:
 - a. will ensure their health and well being.
 - b. represent no threat to public health and or well being.
 - c. is in accordance with all local, state and federal laws that apply.
3. The sale or trade of endangered species is contingent upon the receipt of appropriate permits issued by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and any foreign government as required.

4. This transaction is contingent upon delivery of all records to the recipient prior to shipment of the specimens.
5. In the event of future surplus to another party, the future recipient shall also abide by these conditions.
6. All specimens are considered healthy and of appropriate confirmation unless otherwise noted.
7. *** The juvenile female Snow Leopard will be delivered within one year of today's contract, or else the \$6000.00 will be refunded.
