The unregulated trafficking and sale of exotic wildlife is a growing concern across North America. The BC Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has witnessed first-hand the tragic consequences of this unregulated trade as our Cruelty Investigations Department responds to a growing number of abuse cases involving exotic animals each year. The lack of regulations has also led to serious public health and safety concerns as private owners purchase and keep exotic wild animals such as tigers, venomous snakes and other dangerous animals in urban communities. Tragically, this has resulted in cases of serious injury and even death of British Columbians.

Although a handful of municipalities have bylaws to prevent the possession of such animals, there is no uniform provincial or national approach to address the many health, animal welfare and environmental issues presented by the exotic species pet trade within Canada. As a key stakeholder in the effort to promote safe and humane communities, we invite you to join us for the BC SPCA symposium, To Preserve and Protect: Regulating the Trade and Possession of Exotic Animals, on May 28–29, 2008 in Vancouver, B.C.

This unique event will bring together experts from Canada and the United States to address key issues related to exotic wildlife in captivity, including standards of care, regulation and enforcement, and public health and safety. The symposium program includes keynote addresses by internationally recognized experts, panel discussions and break-out groups for one-on-one discussion. We are also delighted to offer a public presentation on the evening of May 28 by actress and animal advocate Tippi Hedren. Ms. Hedren, who serves as president of the American Sanctuary Association, will speak on the work carried out at her California wildlife sanctuary, Shambala Preserve.

We believe this event will be a valuable opportunity for government agencies, humane societies and representatives from the animal care and veterinary communities to address the unique challenges posed by private ownership of exotic animals and to discuss practical solutions for promoting increased animal welfare and community safety.

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Speaker & Moderator Biographies

Tippi Hedren Actress and President, American Sanctuary Association



American activist, conservationist and actress Tippi Hedren is founder and president of The Roar Foundation, which operates and maintains the Shambala Preserve, perched on the edge of the Mojave Desert near Acton, California. Deeply involved with international conservation groups to save wildlife and an outspoken international voice against cruelty to animals, Tippi devotes much of her time to raising public awareness about animal welfare and conservation. Although she has starred in more than 60 films, including Alfred Hitchcock's The Birds, Tippi's greatest achievement is the difference she has made to animals through her work on the board of The Wildlife Safari, the board of The Elsa Wild Animal Appeal and in her role as president of the American Sanctuary Association.

Dr. Cathy A. Johnson-Delaney Diplomate of the American Board of Veterinary Practitioners, Avian Practice



Dr. Cathy Johnson-Delaney is a 1980 graduate of Washington State University College of Veterinary Medicine. She has practised avian and exotic companion animal medicine in the Greater Puget Sound area for more than 25 years. She is certified by the American Board of Veterinary Practitioners in Avian Practice and received the 2003 Exotic DVM of the Year Award. One of the world's leading authorities on endocrine disease and multi-neoplastic syndrome in ferrets, Cathy is an international speaker on all aspects of non-traditional companion animals and the author of the best-selling Exotic Companion Medicine Handbook for Veterinarians. Her various professional affiliations include the Washington State Veterinary Medical Association, the Association of Avian Veterinarians, the Association of Reptilian and Amphibian Veterinarians and the American Association of Zoo Veterinarians.

Tony Vecchio, Director, Oregon Zoo



Tony Vecchio's prestigious four-decade career in zoo management has led to his current position as Director of the Oregon Zoo. Tony has a bachelor's degree in Environmental Resource Management/Wildlife Conservation from Pennsylvania State University and a master's degree in Biology from the University of South Carolina, where he completed his thesis on primate social behaviour. He is a Professional Fellow of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association and a member of the American Association of Zookeepers. He also serves on the Field Conservation Committee and Pig and Peccary Taxon Advisory Group, is a past board chairman of the Zoo Conservation Outreach Group and has served on the Portland Audubon Society Board of Directors.

Dr. John Nightingale President, Board of Directors of the Canadian Association of Zoos and Aquariums



Dr. John Nightingale is among the most well-known and respected leaders in aquarium operations and management in North America. His education includes a bachelor's degree in Biology from Eastern Oregon State College, a master's degree in Fisheries Biology and a doctorate in Physiology from the University of Washington. He has also completed postgraduate studies in business administration at Seattle University. John joined the Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Centre in 1993, and since that time he has guided the expansion of the aquarium's leadership in conservation research, while focusing operations on maintaining its financially self-supporting status. John has been responsible for the development of some of the best life-support and animal care systems in operation.

Craig Daniell Chief Executive Officer, BC SPCA



Craig Daniell joined the BC Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in November 2002 as General Manager of the Cruelty Investigations Department and was appointed Chief Executive Officer of the Society in December 2003. Before joining the BC SPCA, Craig served as Director of Cruelty Investigations for the Ontario SPCA for three years. Prior to coming to Canada, Craig earned a law degree in his native South Africa and worked in a corporate law firm. He then joined the diplomatic service, serving as a legal and policy advisor for the Department of Foreign Affairs in Pretoria before accepting a post to the United Nations in New York, where he worked on matters related to animal protection, marine life and the environment. Under his leadership, the BC SPCA provides a wide range of services for nearly 42,000 homeless, abused, injured and abandoned animals every year.

Sara Dubois Wildlife Manager, BC SPCA



Sara Dubois grew up just footsteps from the BC SPCA's Wild Animal Rehabilitation Centre (Wild ARC) just west of Victoria, and returned home to take on the position of Manager of Wild ARC in 2004. In 2008, Sara took on a new challenge with the BC SPCA as Manager of Wildlife Services, where she continues to oversee Wild ARC operations but is based in Vancouver in order to focus most of her efforts on provincial wildlife welfare issues, advocacy and policy for the Society. Sara has a Biology degree from the University of Victoria and graduated in 2003 with a master's degree in Animal Welfare from the University of British Columbia.

Shawn Eccles Chief Animal Protection Officer, BC SPCA



Shawn Eccles began his career in animal welfare 28 years ago responding to night emergency calls with the Vancouver Regional Branch of the BC SPCA. Since then, he has held various positions with the Society in shelter operations and cruelty investigations, and in 2003 he was appointed as the BC SPCA's Chief Animal Protection Officer. Shawn has been involved in thousands of animal cruelty investigations throughout his career and served as the lead investigator in a high-profile 2002 case in which more than 100 animals, including several primates and other exotic animals, were removed from two properties in Kaslo, B.C.

Marcie Moriarty
General Manager, Cruelty Investigations Department, BC SPCA



With separate degrees in Animal Biology and Law, Marcie Moriarty draws on all aspects of her background and education as head of the BC SPCA's Cruelty Investigations Department. Marcie completed her degrees at the University of British Columbia, articling at the Vancouver law firm of Farris Vaughan Wills & Murphy. She was called to the bar in May 2003 and went on to practise civil litigation with the firm of Quinlan Abrioux in Vancouver. Her passion for animal welfare and advocacy soon led her to a career with the BC SPCA as General Manager of the society's busy Cruelty Investigations Department and its 54 Special Provincial Constables.

Hugh Coghill Chief Inspector, Ontario SPCA



With a keen interest in animal husbandry and a prior background working in several zoos in Ontario, Hugh Coghill started his career in animal welfare in 1977 with the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Hugh joined the BC SPCA in 2001, but returned in 2005 to the OSPCA, where he currently serves in the role of Chief Inspector. The OSPCA employs nearly 200 cruelty investigations officers who conduct more than 15,000 investigations annually, resulting in more than 500 criminal and provincial offence charges.
